Dream a Little Dream of Me Misty Summertime

Ella Fitzgerald (1917–1996) was an American jazz singer, widely regarded as one of the greatest vocalists of the 20th century. Known as the "First Lady of Song," she possessed remarkable vocal range, precision, and improvisational skill. Her career spanned over six decades, with timeless recordings in jazz, pop, and blues. Fitzgerald's iconic collaborations with jazz legends like Duke Ellington and Louis Armstrong solidified her legacy as a transformative figure in music history.



























Musical Elements

'Misty' is in 4/4 time, with a swung feel. The tempo is andante (111bpm). The dynamics is mainly mezzo piano throughout. The texture is homophonic (melody & accompaniment). The form/structure is 32-Bar Song (AABA).

Melody

The melody of 'Misty' is largely made from notes of the **Eb major scale** (**Eb F G Ab Bb C D**) with one **chromatic** note (**Db**):




This guitar scale is a hybrid of the Eb major scale "C shape," "A shape" and "G shape" (from the CAGED system).


The melodic movement is largely **disjunct**, making use of **arpeggios**. There is an **anacrusis** – unstressed notes before the first full bar – at the start of the piece.


Chords

'Misty' uses eight chords:



There are many ii-V "turnarounds" used throughout, which are very common in Jazz chord progressions. For example, Bbm - Eb7 is a turnaround the to Abmaj7 chord. The Fm7 - Bb7 is a turnaround back to the home key of Eb major.


















The A1 section ends with B7 – E7, which in the key of A minor is II – V, a half cadence and part of the Ii – V – I Jazz progression. The A2 section resolves with the chords B7 (II) – E7 (V) – Am7 (i), a perfect cadence in the key of A minor. All chords contains extensions (7ths), which are common in Jazz.
