HEAD'S MESSAGE

The dose of sunshine this week has been very welcome and it is to be hoped the weather allows people to spend time in the healthy outdoors. This is a good thing because Covid is beginning to increase in infection rates in school and as part of the bigger local and national picture. The guidance is still in place to remain off work/school if there are symptoms and positive test results. This impacts school as staff have to remain at home, and agency staff are difficult to recruit. Like every institution, it means our service is stretched. I am grateful to everyone who is working flat out to ensure a safe and effective education.

This week saw the beginning of the Year 11 trial exams. These are very important for the pupils. If there is re-run of teacher-assessed grades, (and there is a very small but existent chance) then these results would form a significant part of the overall assessment. The trial exams ensure pupils become familiar with the regulations and restrictions so they avoid future breaches. Furthermore, the exams get pupils used to the intensity of the exam room so they are less likely to suffer stress during the real things. This is why we treat them very seriously. Finally, the exams are formative in nature. This means they allow pupils and staff to establish strengths and weaknesses in their knowledge so they can see how to improve in time for the summer sessions.

Once the exams are finished, the Easter break should be a chance for the pupils –and staff – to recharge their batteries. With the exception of some coursework sessions where specialist equipment is needed, we will not be running Easter Workshops over the holidays. These can be counter-productive: pupils have been equipped to revise successfully in their own time and by constructing a meaningful programme. Too often the workshops are seen as a 'get out of jail free' card and as a means of revision. Not so: steady repeated learning, inter-leaved sessions, spaced recall and self-testing are proven to be the most effective ways to revise. Furthermore, this approach builds responsibility and sense of purpose – key character traits for their future lives.

Our rules on mobile phones are there to protect our pupils. They must be turned off and stored safely out of sight until the pupils are off site. Compliance is very good indeed. Most are harmless, some are witty and clever but sometimes the language, abuse and cruelty are beyond belief. Please check how your children are using these platforms and teach them to be civil, polite and respectful whilst on-line as well as off.



- Years 7-8 Feedback from Assessments is now happening.. Main areas for improvement are: prep techniques (we are now sending the Quizlet links in some of the homeworks to help you with your technique); and revising over the older vocabulary . Remember little and often is more powerful than copying in one go
- **Y9 GCSE** start to look over your grammar in preparation for next year. Key verbs—Io have / to be / to do / to make ; opinion phrases + because/ basics like numbers / colours / days / months / times

Y10 10—Mock exams after Easter. We will do a brief speaking test on General Conversation Mod 2 (school questions) and a photocard . Writing topics will be shared before Easter

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- Year 11– Period 6 Wed / Thursday Gold / Blue week and Monday Lunchtimes in L12
- **Real Speaking exams** will start for French the week after Easter: and for Spanish the second week back
- Writing technique building a bank of useful verbs in past / present / future is a good starting point.-remember Writing 90 word and 160 word questions will be weighted towards Theme 3.

In Engineering lessons

Y7 have been researching their literacy themed project to adapt a story into an animated film and design a jitterbug as part of the merchandise to support its launch. Students will be completing their designs and starting manufacture shortly.

Y8 have been learning to work accurately to within a 1mm tolerance by marking out the frame for their automata and carrying out quality control check to ensure their work meets the required tolerance.

Y9 have been learning about industrial practices through carrying out materials inspections, marking out identical products using lean manufacturing techniques such as templates, and cutting out their plane bodies, carrying out and documenting quality control checks at every stage.

Y11 are working on assembling their lamps and completing their design coursework.
