Head Master's Message:

Welcome back after the half-term break. I hope pupils were able to find time to rest and recharge their batteries.

We are always reflecting on our processes in order to improve. As part of this we invite the Executive Head, Mr Gartside, to carry out a series of 'deep dives' into our daily operations. Mr Gartside is well used to this as an Ofsted inspector, so his observations and insight are valuable. 'Deep dives' is the vernacular term for the new Ofsted framework for scrutiny of schools: rather than data and fleeting observation, it's a chance to discuss at length the experience of pupils and teachers within the school. Pupil voice is really important, and it was very encouraging to hear how the pupils were embracing the Cestrian Way so positively. The 'deep dives' will continue next week.

Strike Action

There is a further planned day of strike action on Tuesday 28th February. Parents have received an email about this, and full details are on our website. Essentially:

Pupils in Year 11 doing their mock exams must attend school as normal with the following adjustment: 8.30 am Y11 Geography pupils only; ALL Y11 pupils in for 11am Physics exam. All Y11 to return home after Physics exam.

School will otherwise be open only for vulnerable pupils and pupils of critical workers.

If your child is not in Year 11, you may apply for a place by completing this form: <u>Vulnerable pupils and pupils of critical</u> workers This must be completed by 1.30pm Monday 27th February. The form is also available on our website. We will notify you by the end of the day if the place is available. We cannot guarantee all places.

Academic. All pupils are issued with a Learning Journal. The inside page shows the mainstay of our monitoring and reporting learning framework. Within the classroom, the bottom line is that pupils use every minute to promote their and others' learning. At a simple level, the issue we have with chatter is that it hinders learning. So in the first instance, we remind the child that their attitude is hampering progress – bottom right of the grid. We correct them and lead them to better learning. After that, if they choose to still misbehave and chat and disrupt, then a B2 behaviour point is issued, with a consequence of a breaktime detention. So, we see the issue not so much as the chatter, but the disruption to learning and the poor choice to continue to do so.

Behaviour. I hope parents appreciate the fortnightly pastoral report home sent via Arbor. We give far more positive feedback than negative — over 30 000 instances of feedback given already this year. Please take time to review this fortnightly report and whatever is happening, aim for even better next time!

Character. Parents and pupils may well remember last year's Culture Day when many students dressed in costumes reflective of their own cultural backgrounds and there was a food feast of savouries and snacks testifying to the cultural mix of the school's population. This day is repeated this year on March 13th. Look out for further details.

This year, we are very pleased to note that the North Cestrian team of **Jafar B** and **Tilola A** (*pictured l,r*) were **placed second out of 36 teams** in the North West Regional Finals of the Oxford Union Debating Competition and as such will compete in the finals on March 11th held at the Oxford Union in Oxford. This is a fantastic achievement, and we wish them luck for the finals next month.

WHAT IS PUPIL PREMIUM FUNDING?

The Pupil Premium Grant A Guide for Families

What is the Pupil Premium Grant?

The funding the school receives to improve educational outcomes for disadvantaged pupils. If you think that your child should qualify for the grant, please contact Mrs. Iqbal on s.iqbal@northcestrian.co.uk

Who is eligible for Pupil Premium funding?

Pupils who receive free school meals (FSM) or even if the pupil qualified for free school meals at primary school.

Children who have been adopted from care or have left care.

Children who are looked after by the local authority.

Children whose parents serve in the armed forces.

Why does the school receive the funding?

Disadvantaged pupils face additional challenges in reaching their potential at school and often do not perform as well as their peers.

Our job is to work with you to identify and remove any barriers to learning. This may include, small group tutoring, support getting to school, ensuring all pupils have the correct stationery and resources, and access to supportive staff.

What is the main aim of the funding?

The main aim is to raise attainment; this is supported not only through academic strategies both in-class and beyond school, but also by improving personal development (Cestrian Behaviour and Cestrian Character) including mental health, better attendance, extra-curricular opportunities, trips and cultural capital, and your future in education and careers.

Tickets go on sale this week for Family Easter Egg Bingo taking place on **Friday 24th March**.

So what exactly is it? As the name suggests it is a Family Bingo event, with an Easter twist......

Families buy tickets in advance (£2.00 per person or £5.00 per family of up to 4 people) to come along to play some fun Bingo. Children <u>must</u> be accompanied by an adult, especially the younger children who may need more help.

Doors open at 6.45pm, bar opens at 7pm, eyes down by 7.15pm. We hope to play up to three games of Bingo, as well as one or two other activities, finishing around 9pm.

Bingo cards are provided to everyone with a ticket. We ask that you try and remember to bring your own pen, however there will be some daubers (Bingo pens) there to buy.

Unlike normal Bingo sessions, there are multiple line and full house winners and we ensure that most children go home with a prize. The rules are explained at the start of the session.

The Bingo caller goes through at a slow and steady pace so that the event <u>is suitable</u> <u>for all students and younger siblings</u>, giving them a chance to find the numbers and have fun!

Refreshments will also be available to purchase; hot dogs, crisps, snacks and drinks.
