

#### Head Master's Message:

I have some sympathy because if pupils don't experience 'high brow' culture at school, they may never do so. This would be a shame. 

The finals' event was hectic! Jafar read a guide on tips for the Oxford Finals' whilst Tilola rested her throat as we drove south from Altrincham on Friday. Over the evening meal we practised techniques and dived into justifications and objections to 'career politicians' - which, by chance, was the motion in the third round the

next day. In the Union, the students from around the world gathered to see the competition draw and get the first view of the debate motions. Jafar (*pictured right*) and Tilola represented North Cestrian fantastically. They often had just 5 minutes preparation time but were adept and sophisticated to bring their cultural capital and persuasion to the opposition schools. In the first four rounds the judges scored NCS 4th, 4th, 2nd, then 1st! Alas this was not quite enough to go beyond the quarter finals, but what a debut against schools including Eton, University College London, and national schools of the Philippines and South Africa, and many top British private schools.

# ACADEMIC NEWS - Dr Askey

#### Question yourself to greater success.

**Your brain loves questions.** In a study on the power and type of self-talk, participants were divided into two groups.

The first asked themselves questions: "Will I do well?"

The other gave declarations of success: "I will do well"

When faced with challenging anagrams, the group who had asked themselves questions answered significantly more than their peers.

One possible reason why this strategy is effective is because **by** asking yourself questions, your brain automatically starts searching for answers, acting as a call to action.

If you ask yourself **What, Why, How, Who** and **Where** questions, you can improve your metacognition, memory, growth mindset, social support and concentration.

**Metacognition** is the ability to critically analyse how you think, or in simple terms, having self-awareness and control over your thoughts. It is best described as developing appropriate and **helpful thinking strategies.** 

For the best results, think about tasks in three stages

- Before the task
- During the task
- After the task

By searching for connections to your previous experiences, knowledge and feedback, your brain seeks answers to help you tackle new problems.

The big advantage of learning this skill is that the **strategies are completely transferrable** to other tasks and scenarios.

This will **increase your confidence** to tackle anything from athletics to algebra.

As an added bonus, research has shown that improvement from these strategies can be evident in just two weeks.

Just enough time to try it before the end of term!

Tickets go on sale this week for Family Easter Egg Bingo taking place on **Friday 24th March**.

So what exactly is it? As the name suggests it is a Family Bingo event, with an Easter twist......

Families buy tickets in advance (£2.00 per person or £5.00 per family of up to 4 people) to come along to play some fun Bingo. Children <u>must</u> be accompanied by an adult, especially the younger children who may need more help.
