HEAD'S MESSAGE

The recent Times Education Commission report on the nature of education in England and Wales was not particularly uplifting in its conclusions and called for a fundamental rethink of the purpose of schools. Whilst I agree with many of its findings, I think the overall picture it presents is a distortion of the real state of affairs. I speak about this school, but I know colleagues up and down the country would echo my sentiments. I am very proud of the young people who leave this school who are confident, resilient, well-qualified and ambitious. Our recent interviews for prefects reveal students who are articulate, passionate and with a concern for the environment and the well-being of others. We have every reason to be optimistic about the future.

One issue that was raised was the push to improve literacy. I don't believe there's a crisis – our children are exposed to a wide variety of texts, are encouraged to be critical in their views and are taught the skills required to give life to their imaginations and creativity. But I do believe any effort to improve literacy further is a good step. The ability to read with insight, communicate effectively, argue persuasively and speak with authority is vital not only to achieve success in other subjects but also to go on to lead rich and fulfilling lives. To this end, I am very pleased that school has signed up to a programme called Reading Plus. This encourages children to engage with texts in a fun and interesting way via their e-devices. There is considerable 'gamification' in the experience to act as incentive to read with speed and accuracy and the range of texts on offer is designed to match reading preferences. All children will have access to this. In order to assess pupils and link them in to Reading Plus we would like to use the start of next term as the launch-pad. Therefore, I have made a slight change to the start times of pupils in September. Parents will also receive a separate email.





The impact of climate change ...

Dozens of people have died, many of them young children, in the worst floods north-east

Bangladesh has seen in more than a century. More than four million people have been left stranded. Where the normal monsoon floods bring around 840mm in June, this last month has seen double the amount of rainfall hitting the country which is low-lying and has a population of 164 million. More than 80 people have been killed in floods in Bangladesh since mid-May, most of them in the north-east. With more than 700 rivers in the country and melt-water coming down from the Himalayas, Bangladesh has had to deal with flooding for centuries and its many rivers are the source of great beauty and agricultural provision but also disaster and loss of life.



contrast ...

Italy has declared a state of emergency in its drought-hit northern regions. Five areas have experienced an unusually early heatwave and lack of rainfall, in particular the Po ~Valley which has been hit by its worst drought in 70 years. According to Italy's largest agricultural union, Coldiretti, the drought threatens more than 30% of national agricultural production and half of the farms in the Po valley, where Parma ham is produced. Lakes Maggiore and Garda have also experienced lower than normal water levels for this time of year, while further

south the Tiber River, which runs through Rome, also dropped.

We are delighted to be able to share the learning journey and successes of our students exploring the big questions of theology, philosophy and what it means to be a citizen in Britain today.

As we approach the end of the school year it is often helpful to reflect on what our year has been and how we would like our next year to be. A hymn that used to be popular when I was at school and that my children now sing at their school is "One More Step Along the Road I go" which includes the lyrics, "And it's from the old I travel to the new, Keep me travelling along with you." This year has been an exciting year of study and exploration across all age groups in RE and Mr Dennison and I are already looking forward to our new year of learning in September.

Religious Education at Key Stage 3

Year 7 have been exploring Buddhism and thinking about what it means to be a Buddhist today? We have looked at the life of the Buddha, studied the Buddha's teachings, known as the Dharma or path and tried some meditation in class.

Year 8 have been studying many faiths as part of our thematic unit on Pilgrimage – we have toured the world looking at the pilgrimage sites of Lourdes, Mecca, Jerusalem, Amritsar and Bodh Gaya and along the way have asked the question – What makes a journey a pilgrimage? We have also thought about whether a non-religious journey can be a pilgrimage and looked at the appeal of Graceland for Elvis fans.

Year 9 have been very engaged in our latest GCSE unit of Crime and Punishment thinking about issues of punishment, the death penalty, forgiveness and causes of crime.
