Last week's newsletter had a safeguarding theme and I want to continue with the same this week. One of the key statutory guidance documents that people working with children have to follow is 'Working Together'. The fundamental premise is that responsible adults and agencies must work together to keep children safe.

#### **Operation Encompass**

Children spend a good proportion of their childhood in the care of education professionals alongside all the associated support staff. Sadly, it is often the people children link to in their neighbourhoods or social networks, or sometimes the actual home environment that are the reason for the child's risk of harm or neglect. It is appropriate that school works with local support agencies, often via the local authority or police to find the right help and course of action. Where a child is the victim, directly or indirectly, of an episode of domestic abuse, and the police are involved, the reporting officer will also consider the impact on the child. They will listen to them and hear their voice. This then is made known to the child's school, as part of what is known as OPERATION ENCOMPASS. This is so we can understand the child's situation and better support them. It's right that parents are aware of this procedure so they know the sort of information schools are provided with.

#### **Cestrian ABC**

#### Academic.

Much of the school's approach to teaching and learning is based upon cognitive science and applying the most effective methods to allow pupils to make rapid progress. One strand of this is the rewarding of genuine effort rather the actual outcome. This promotes a growth mindset and the mantra to learn from one's mistakes. The Attitude to Learning grid – found at the front of your child's learning journal - shows how we reward pupils in class. Your Arbor parent app gives you up to date details of how your child's attitude to learning is developing – look out for the positives achieved.

#### Behaviour.

Any observation of behaviour of our pupils in and around school would remark on the calm orderliness of the classrooms and corridors and the energetic and good natured play at break times. Even so, I ask that parents support us in trying to reduce litter. Most pupils use the litter bins but some are too casual or forgetful and this creates visible mess at times. We work with our caterers to reduce wrappings and I ask that parents do the same – packed lunches, crisp packets and the like - if wrappings can be kept to the minimum it would help to reduce litter. I am grateful to the PTFA for supporting the purchase of more litter bins.

#### Character.

It was great to see pupil involvement in assemblies this week, leading on the theme of International Day of Peace. Mrs Isherwood-Cann spoke on the beginnings and achievements of this event and also arranged for pupils to address school with multi-faith prayers for peace. Particular credit should go to Martha C and Elise T for stepping up at the last minute to stand in for absent pupils: they were generous and resilient

Hala A (Alty Girls Sixth Form): On GCSE Results Day I had butterflies in my stomach: nervousness and excitement. I waited to open my grades after 2 years of hard work, and I knew I had worked hard and would get the grades I deserved. I was overwhelmed with Grade 9s in every subject. I am writing to my fellow students to share my story, and prove, that all your hard work truly does pay off. I want to share a few tips... My key tip is be purposeful and resilient, making sure you do small amounts every day: revising for the end of topic tests or mock exams, as well as Prep. Secondly, while you are learning the topic, make sure you ask your teachers for help if you do not understand anything or need guidance on how to revise. Coming into sixth form, I have come to appreciate prep for the successful habits it has taught me, preparing yourself before coming into lesson only enhances and ensures the lesson is the most productive it can be for you. Finally, it is not easily, there will be ups and downs, build your passion and build your team around you (people and routines) to help your resilience grow.

George R (University of Manchester): My time at North Cestrian was characterised in changes the school helped to develop in me. Whatever was daunting, from starting a big school to exams, the caring staff, the culture and the lessons had a positive influence on my self belief and confidence. I quickly became enthusiastic about achieving my best and I discovered and developed a vision towards my future. Discipline and diligence helped me excel academically and enthusiasm and generosity made me feel part of a wider community. I really want you to take up the extracurricular opportunities, broaden your horizons. I was Head Boy as result of developing my character. It helped me understand leadership, team working, and public speaking to assemblies. Skills that are now critical for me in my future ambitions. I am now completing volunteer work and my gap year working for a local NHS Trust which ahead of a Biomedical Sciences degree.

Jan-Willem V (Sixth Form): One very important feature of my character development during my time at NCS was resilience. I made mini goals and short term rewards to get me through to the big goal, like the exams at the end. Self discipline! Controlling distractions like the phone and the Xbox in order to win things as simple or as complex as waking up early in the morning to get to school, pushing myself to do another Prep test, or doing past paper exam practise. Self discipline may seem a bit annoying at first but getting into a daily rhythm and schedule to get that last bit of knowledge into your head can make a huge difference! Lastly, the most important trait to my success was learning from mistakes. I had loads of trials and errors but I always used the feedback from teachers and just want to get that little bit better / higher mark each time. Hard work was the reason I got the grades I wanted. It's tough, you will need resilience and purpose plus your support team... then you will most certainly be the best you can be! Now go live rich and fulfilling lives!

Frankie M (Alty Boys Sixth Form): I am last year's head boy. I returned during the Open Evening and saw exemplary behaviour and diligence. Looking back on my 5 years at NCS I picked up a huge number of tips to share. My most prominent character traits were being Purposeful, Resilient, and learning from my mistakes. I can tell you for definite that to give yourself purpose and reason for what you are doing, be it work, revision or research, then progress as well as achievement will become more apparent. Don't let understanding slip away from you. Your teachers are the best support for this and once you gain your momentum you'll see progress everywhere, more importantly your confidence will grow. Onto Resilience... if there was something I was susceptible to, it was feeling overwhelmed and stressed. However, using feedback and asking for support built self-confidence and self-belief. It must have been resilience, I didn't know it at the time, but just sticking at something meant I conquered the challenge way more often than not! The final exams were less stress than the mocks and practice exams! So, the advice I would give is that rest, reflection and planning can be some great healers if you're feeling down and will help you get back on track with your studies + behaviour. Outside school I built Cultural Capital from philosophy books which helped me realise something that will stick with me forever "You can't control everything that happens to you, but you can control how it affects you". "School is a safe place where you can make infinite mistakes", just do that bit better each time: learn from the mistakes and delapsus resurgam. My friends spent hours waiting for me ask teachers questions. I couldn't bare not understanding where I've gone wrong. Without me being responsible for my own learning in this way I highly doubt I would have achieved my eight grade 9s, a grade 8 and a grade 7. From philosopher Confucius "He who asks a question is a fool for a minute, the man who does not is a fool for life". I guarantee you that the only difference between me and others is that I was brave enough to ask the question everyone else wanted to.

## Cestrians are Organised and have High Standards

Your Learning Journal is designed to help you become more organised, independent learners. Routine habits are systems that you do without thinking. They reduce demand on your working memory so you spend more time thinking of content rather than the process. By both being prepared and reflecting on what you can do and what you need to do better, your learning and progress will improve.

The front of the Journal contains guidance standards that we expect for uniform, behaviour and learning.

You are expected to have your Journal on the desk in every lesson and available in briefings.

You should record the subjects you have each day – this enables you to make any notes and reminders for, or from, the lesson.

You could ask parents to check/quiz and tick off your prep.

Remember that quizzing is the best way to make sure that you transfer knowledge to your long term memory.

Teachers will make a note of any prep that has fallen below the standard expected. 2 signatures will lead to a PREP POINT.

## **Language for Winning**

In this week's Year 11 Language for Winning lessons, we have been discussing how unexpected challenges can derail us from achieving.

Recent studies show that trials and tests can act as barriers to our learning and ultimately our successes. We can split these challenges / barriers / events into 3 categories and when we analyse them, we can prepare to combat their potential negativity.

- 1. **Unexpected interference** is responsible for 20 percent of factors that contribute to our challenges and put us under pressure to achieve.
- 2. **External Influences** also account for 20 percent of challenge BUT can be anticipated. We are always going to know about them in advance and there isn't a huge surprise when they happen (mock exams, college applications etc.)
- 3. **Internal factors** are the biggest hinderance to our achievement and account for 60 percent of factors that could potential distract, dishearten and stop us from reaching our potential. These are internal factors such as 'lack of vision', 'perfectionism' and fear. This list is endless.

Leaving aside the unexpected which can strike at any time, certain internal challenges might arrive at predictable points in the year ahead. We are all different but there might also be broad similarities between the psychological journeys we take. If we can see that the next few months might be hard, let's try to figure out a way through.
